* Note for parents: The many dragon stories (often in remarkable detail) around the world clearly speak of a time when people saw live dinosaurs. These often have the dragon emitting "fire and smoke." See also Job chapter 41, the description of the fierce leviathan. Biologically, there is no reason why some (now extinct) creatures may not have had this feature. The living bombardier beetle, for example, "blasts" its enemies with a jet of heat from a chemical reaction akin to an explosion. wakened by the songbirds at daybreak, the two dragons wasted no time as they leaped from the nest inside their cozy den. Instantly, they pounced on each other, and the game was on. They playfully wrestled and chased each other in circles through the morning mist that rose from the ground. The sounds of the dragons as they frolicked carried through the garden and woke Adam and Eve.
